





### Getting Around Santa Barbara

Santa Barbara is a good walking town. In the downtown and waterfront areas, the streets are walkable and distances are close. For longer trips, busses, bikes and taxis can get you around. For traveling outside of the downtown area a car is recommended.

### **Electric Shuttle**

The Waterfront and State Street electric cover the waterfront and downtown areas of Santa Barbara. The Waterfront Shuttle picks up in front of the Radisson every 30 minutes and goes down Cabrillo Blvd. to Stearns Wharf. The State Street Shuttle goes up and down State Street every 12 minutes. Fare is 25 cents.

### **MTD Busses**

Regular MTD bus service covers much of Santa Barbara and Goleta. The main transit center is at 1020 Chapala Street (at Carrillo). Fares are \$1.00. Call (805) 963-3364 for schedule information.

### **Bicycles**

Downtown Santa Barbara has a good system of bicycle lanes and there is a bike path running the length of the waterfront. Bicycles are available for rental at several locations around lower State Street and Stearns Wharf. Call Wheel Fun Rentals at 966-2282 if you would like to rent a bicycle to cruise up and down the waterfront.
